

There has been noticeable logging activity along Port Albion Rd. I would like to acknowledge questions that have recently

arisen in respect to this project; the specific cutblocks of land are privately owned and under the operation of Mosaic Forest Management. Mosaic Forest Management operates with an Indigenous Relations Policy and is providing resource-based employment for citizens within the surrounding nations. The current logging activities are not direct from Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government. Questions, concerns, or for employment opportunities, please reach out to Mosaic Forest Management.



Investment into the West Coast of Vancouver Island is to remove derelict vessels and to clean up marine debris along the West Coast beaches. This will bring in two separate opportunities, with both the Coastal Restoration Society and Surfrider Pacific Rim.

The Derelict Vessel Program is a direct initiative and from the Coastal Restoration Society where funding has been alloted to provide opportunities for First Nation citizens. The CRS is looking for 5 Technicians starting May 18. Position information is available through the Lands and Resources Department.

The second initiative will be with Surfrider Pacific Rim, starting in September. With details released at a later date. We are grateful to be one of many local nations taking part in this program!

Harvest Cards were issued at the Cixwatin Centre on April 30th. Thank you for to the YG team to make this happen for


the citizens. Any citizens, urban and local requiring a new Harvest Card or a renewal, please contact the Lands and Resources Department. Urban dates for Harvest Card processing are soon to be announced.

The 2021 Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government Food, Social, and Ceremonial Fish Program, Request for Proposal is out and available within this newsletter. Please submit to the contacts provided.

April 23, Yuułu?ił?atḥ was included in a joint press release, alongside the Districts of Ucluelet/Tofino, Tourism Ucluelet/Tofino, Tla-o-qui-aht, and Toquaht. This release was guided to reduce visitors to the area and abide by the current Public Health Orders, as recently issued by the Provincial Government. YG restrictions remain in place for hitaċu and we strongly encourage only essential travel within your community and island regions.

Notice of Fee Simple Grant Applications are available online for viewing. There are currently 6 applications available for view. More applications are underway.

Rose is Yuułu?ił?aqsup (a Yuułu?ił?atḥ woman) from the

McCarthy family and Tom family from Hesquiaht. Born and raised in Victoria, Rose has slowly been moving closer and closer to home. "One day I would like to move all the way home to hitacu, but right now I am ecstatic to be in Port Alberni on Nuu-chah-nulth territory again."

Growing up surrounded by strong Nuu-chah-nulth women, gave Rose the drive to learn all she can and teach the learnings of her own culture. By doing so, Rose taught elementary and middle school students within the Lake Cowichan School District, in how to properly harvest and prepare cedar bark for weaving, in a traditional way.

Rose not only engages herself as a teacher, but also as a student. Rose has completed the Foundations in Technology Program through the First Nations Technology Council. Here she learned to combine her love of culture with technology.

Registered Nurse, Judy Gleeson joins the Health and Social Services team! Judy will be working alongside Simble and assisting Dr. Marshall during Thursday's clinic. Operating with a much needed Registered Nurse will continue to open opportunities within the Health Department, including on-site immunizations, workshops, and health related priorities.

The Community Safety Team (CST) is well underway! You may have noticed familiar citizens at the entry of hitaću and patrolling the com-

# **Special Announcement**

Groups Collaborate Across BC for \$9.5M Shoreline Clean-Up Project

Tofino, British Columbia, April 28th, 2021.

Coastal Restoration Society (CRS) and Surfrider Pacific Rim are celebrating today after being named funding recipients from the Clean Coast, Clean Water Initiative; a project to clear B.C shores of marine debris and derelict vessels. The non-profits will be leading shoreline clean-up and derelict vessel removal projects in the territories of the Tla-o-qui-aht, Hesquiaht, Ahousaht, Tseshaht and Yuulu?il?ath with sorting and transportation running through the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District, and the municipalities of Tofino and Ucluelet. Thanks to today's funding announcement from the Province of British Columbia through the Ministry of Environment and Climate Change Strategy, projects are on track to begin this summer.

The "West Coast Vancouver Island Coastal Improvement Project - Phase 1" overseen by Coastal Restoration Society focuses on creating job opportunities in rural and remote areas, fostering partnerships between First Nations, nonprofits, volunteer associations, industry and local governments. Historically, these groups and other concerned citizens and environmental stewards have been volunteering their time and energy to clean BC coastlines. The Clean Coast, Clean Waters Initiative funding provides paid opportunities for these groups to plan and engage in the removal of heavily accumulated debris from industry, ocean tides, tourism and derelict vessels, with the goal of diverting as much away from landfills and into second life as possible.

Surfrider, CRS, and the Tla-o-qui-aht, Hesquiaht, Ahousaht, Tseshaht and Yuułu?ił?atḥ have partnered in their pursuit of funding from the CCCW Funding initiative, and are excited about the prospect of both cleaner

beaches and jobs coming to the area.

"Shoreline cleanup is a cornerstone of Surfrider's work for the protection and enjoyment of the ocean, waves, and beaches, for all people," Surfrider's Beach Clean and Youth Program Coordinator Alys Hoyland shared. "We could not be more thrilled to work alongside our First Nations partners to remove debris, collect data on key pollutants, and use this data to inform our efforts to find upstream solutions to the plastic pollution crisis."

On behalf of the Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ Government – Ucluelet First Nation, President Charles McCarthy said, "We look forward to working with the Coastal Restoration Society and Surfrider Pacific Rim, for the partnered removal of marine debris and providing environmental opportunities for the citizens of Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ, and for our neighbouring nations. The marine ecosystem is a vital source for our culture, sustains our livelihood, and home. Kelco, kleco."

Coastal Restoration Society is administering the complete \$2.2M West Coast Vancouver Island Coastal Improvement Project as well as completing derelict vessel removals in Yuułu?ił?atḥ territory.

"We are grateful for the funding to move forward on these timely and necessary projects to support the health of the shorelines and coastal livelihoods," Capt Josh Temple, Executive Director of Coastal Restoration Society shared. "We're excited to once again be working with host First Nations, and we know that these relationships and partnerships are at the heart of all successful projects. We hope that funding like this for projects of this scope expands our collective capacity for stewardship."

Clean-ups will commence in May, and continue until the end of October. Marine debris sorting is anticipated to take place at the Ocean Legacy Recycling Centre from July to October.

   Our reported harvest and catch helps us and B.C. know if our "reasonable opportunity" to harvest is decreasing - the more you report, more future allocations.

# **Health & Social Services**

**Dr. Carrie Marshall's Thursday Clinics** have been well received within the hitacu community. The clinics have been popular and the staff at the huupatu Centre have been busy. Resources and services have been well utilized.

We are still waiting for the second dose of the Moderna vaccination. We will contact all citizens who require a second dose, personally, to set an appointment.

The Province of BC has travel restrictions for non-essential travel in BC are in place effective now, **until May 25th**, **2021.** Fines can be given to people who leave their region for non-essential travel. Stay local and stay in your community. Do not travel for non-essential reasons.

#### What does this mean?

Travel has been reduced to health regions; the order combines B.C.'s five health authorities into three regions of the province. Travel into and out of the regions for non-essential reasons is not allowed and is now prohibited by law.

#### The health regions are:

- Lower Mainland and Fraser Valley (Fraser Health and Vancouver Coastal Health)
- Northern/Interior (Northern Health and Interior Health, including Bella Coola Valley, the Central Coast and Hope)
  - Residents from the Hope area can travel to Chilliwack for essential goods and supplies
  - Residents from the Bella Coola Valley and Central Coast area can travel to Port Hardy for essential goods and supplies
- Vancouver Island (Vancouver Island Health)





For residents on Vancouver Island, it is important to be familiar with your own regions. These regions can be found at www.islandhealth.ca/your-region, or as listed in the last release on April 23, 2021. We ask citizens to travel for essential pur-

poses only, reducing this essential travel to Port Alberni or Nanaimo if you are in Ucluelet. Victoria, Duncan, and Chemainus residents to stay in their southern region, and northern islanders to stay within northern regions (refrain from travel to the west coast, or south island).

The **Community Internship Program** is seeing impressive success. Would like to acknowledge Zaid Sarigat and his crew of Youth for the work they have been doing together; for mental health and throughout the community of hitaću.

There will be a special Youth Profile in the Summer edition of the Umacuk, scheduled for release in June. In this profile, we will highlight one of our successful interns, who has been in program since it has started and has shown much growth and advancement, within the program and for himself.

Registered Nurse, Judy Gleeson has been added to the Health and Social Services Team, providing much support for the Health Centre and will be assisting Dr. Carrie Marshall for Thursday's Health Clinic. This may offer some relief for the at capacity appointments and reduce wait time.

With a RN on-site, we will be working on offering resources such as in-house immunizations and future prenatal workshops. We are working to forward to provide more progressive resources to hitaću. Stay tuned for more information and a formal welcome for Judy.

The huupatu Centre will be getting a bit of a face lift, as we search for a local Nuu-chah-nulth artist to take on the task of painting a mural in the boardroom. We have also been working on refurbishing more space to offer summer programs and welcome more Youth, respectfully and distantly, into the Centre for Homework Club and other activities.

**The Education Program** will see the introduction of STEM, which includes science, technology, engineering, and medicine based learning resources. We will provide more information at a later date.

#### The Community Safety Team is Back!



The **Community Safety Program** is back up and running! The program officially restarted on Friday, April 30th, 2021.

There has been much traffic within hitacu for the last while and our CST has been re-established to keep the community comfortable for residents. The CST will

# WildsafeBC xichuuł hitaċu-Macoah

The WildSafeBC Åicḥuuł hitacu-Macoah Program is back for another season and we are here to work with everyone to keep wildlife wild and communities safe. While the COVID-19 pandemic may be keeping many of us at home, that is not true for čims (black bears) and other wildlife that live nearby. As Community Coordinator, I will be working hard to reach out to community members in new and innovative ways that maintain physical distancing and safety for the community.

At this time of the year, **čims** are seeking out lush greens such as grasses, sedges, horsetails, skunk cabbage and other protein-rich fresh growth. A lot of these food sources can often be found close to roads which is why it is important to stay alert while driving to reduce the risk of wildlife collision especially when road conditions are not optimal.

Spring is also a great time to make sure your living space is free of attractants and that unnatural food sources like garbage, backyard compost, pet food, bird feeders and other items are secure and kept away from čims and other wild-life. Keeping community bins latched also makes a great difference for čims that are tempted to access the contents. By securing the metal bar and using the clasp, čims are less

likely to get into conflict while they move through the community to get from one area to another.

I am really happy to be back for a second season and I look forward to connecting with everyone to keep wildlife wild and the communities safe. Don't hesitate to reach out to

me directly if you have any questions or suggestions at hitaċu-macoah@wild-safebc.com. Follow the WildSafeBC hitaċu-Macoah Facebook page for regular tips on how to best manage attractants, updates on WildSafeBC's activities and events and more information about local wildlife.

Remember to report all sightings of čims, qwayaciik (wolves) and kayuumin (cougars) in urban areas to the Conservation Officer Service at 1-877-952-7277. These reports are uploaded daily to WildSafe-BC's Wildlife Alert Reporting Program (WARP), available at www.wildsafebc. com/warp. This program allows you to see what wildlife has been reported in your neighbourhood and be alerted of new sightings.

#### **TOP 10 WAYS TO HELP WILDLIFE**

- **1.** Keep your garbage secure store it in a secure location indoors or a bear-resistant enclosure.
- **2.** Only put your garbage/compost/recyclables out on collection day never the night before.
- 3. Manage your fruit trees so that fruit is picked as it ripens and no windfall accumulates.
- **4.** Bring bird feeders in from April through November and when they are out, ensure that the ground underneath is kept free of seeds.
- 5. Feed pets indoors.
- Maintain your compost so that it doesn't smell. Add fruit slowly. Never add meat or other animal products.
- Protect orchards, beehives and small livestock with a properly installed and maintained electric fence.
- 8. Respect wild animals by not feeding them. Food-conditioned wildlife are more likely to come into conflict.
- 9. Keep barbecues clean and odour free.
- 10. Report any wildlife in conflict immediately to the Conservation Officer Service 24/7 at 1.877.952.7277.

#### Small & Medium Sized Business Recovery Grant

This program has been extended to August 31, 2021 or until funds are fully expended, whichever comes first.

- Businesses only need to show a 30% revenue loss from March 2020 to now when compared to the same one-month period in 2019
- Get help preparing a complete application package from a registered Small Business BC service provider

If you applied to the program prior to March 4, 2021:

- You do not need to resubmit an application
- Applications received prior to changes will be reviewed under updated program criteria
- Businesses that have already been approved for funding are not affected by these changes

Grants of \$10,000 to \$30,000 are available to small and medium sized B.C. businesses impacted by COVID-19. An additional \$5,000 to \$15,000 grant is available to eligible tourism-related businesses.


