



President's Message

There has been a Removal of Member of Legislature, pertaining to the ha'wilth Wilson Jack for the remainder of the 2019-2023 term, due to conduct determined to be contrary to the *Code of Conduct and Conflict Interest Act*.

The administration will be working with the ha'wiih Advisory Council to have the ha'wilth memberseat on the Legislature filled as soon as is possible. The appointment of a hereditary chief to the

Legislature is made by the ha'wiih Advisory Council. The Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government will be requesting a meeting of the Council to support them through the appointment process.

A summit was held late February for the dispersed/unauthorized camping in the back roads. From this a West Coast Task Force was created with representation from Yuułu?ił?atḥ, Toquaht, Tla-o-qui-aht, Districts of Ucluelet and Tofino, Tourism Ucluelet, ACRD, PRNP (Parks), Ministry

of Transportation, RCMP, and a few more select. Meetings have been taking place to set short term and long term goals for mitigating the issues we are seeing on the back roads, without setting gates and pushing traffic into other areas such as in Yuułu?ił?atḥ TSL and Toquaht lands. This season will start with strong communication and short term solutions.

The Yuułu?ił?atḥ Group of Businesses is seeking three citizens to become Directors of the Operating Board. This is a great opportunity for citizens who have knowledge and experience in business and entrepreneurial initiative, or who see interest in Entrepreneurial activities.

Received from the Pacific Rim National Park



The Government of Canada has a long-term commitment to renewing nation-to-nation relationships with Indigenous peoples and working with Indigenous partners, based on recognition of rights, respect, and cooperation. On behalf of the Parks Canada Agency, Pacific Rim National Park Reserve truly appreciates and values the partnerships and the collaboration to co-manage with the nine

First Nations whose hahuuti is within the boundaries of the national park reserve.

As a sign of that commitment, Pacific Rim National Park Reserve uses the First Nations Open Door to remove barriers and provide free access to all First Nation members who have a connection to the lands and waters within the national park reserve. Starting April 1, 2022, the First Nations Open Door is available to all nine First Nations using a newly designed hangtag with the logos of the following nations: Tla-o-qui-aht First Nations, Yuułu?ił?atḥ, Tseshaht First Nation, Toquaht Nation, Hupacasath First Nation, Uchucklesaht Tribe, Huu-ay-aht First Nations, Ditidaht First Nation, and Pacheedaht First Nation.

A significant change to note is that these hangtags are now valid for five years versus the one-year annual passes. Reminder, these hangtags can be used in all three units of the national park reserve: Long Beach, Broken Group Islands and the West Coast Trail. These new hangtags can be distributed to all eligible community members that live, work or are connected to your nation.

Satellite Office

Port Alberni Satellite Office: Renovations are underway. Nest step, we will be reaching out to the departments to

start discussing planning and programming for the new space. We look forward to opening up this new location to offer future programing and services for our urban citizens!

Economic Development Engagement Sessions with MNP

The Strategic Planning Survey that was released earlier in the year saw 62 participants total, on and off TSL (Treaty Settlement Lands). As a follow up to the Strategic Planning Survey, YG Economic Development Officer, Corey Rich and three representatives from MNP (a leading national consulting firm for Indigenous Nations in Canada) host-

ed community Engagement Sessions. There was a session for Youth, Elders, Entrepreneurs, and a general Community session. In these sessions, the results of the Strategy was shared and the main focus was to gather the insight from individual groups, through round table discussion, on what Yuułu?ił?atḥ's economic future could look like for citizens.

A separate discussion was held online via Zoom for urban citizen engagement. Due to unforeseen technical difficulties the session was cut short and will resume at a later date in May.

We thank everyone for their participation in the survey and through these engagement sessions. There will be pictures and more information in the Spring edition of the Umacuk!

Clayoquot Biosphere Trust Education Awards

The CBT'S Annual Education Awards are coming up and can be accessed by any graduate student from 2021 (with conditions) and 2022 school years from the 5 Nations listed below, no matter where they live.

From the CBT - The Central Region Nuu-Chah-Nulth Education Award Program supports students that are registered members of the Hesquiaht First Nation, Ahousaht First Nation, Tla-o-qui-aht First Nations, Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ Government or Toquaht Nation who are graduating from high school and are attending an accredited post-secondary institution in the upcoming academic year. Students do not have to reside in the Clayoquot Biosphere Region. The education award amount is up to \$12,000 over 4 years to support trade certifications, university, and other post-secondary education programs.

hitacu Water Line Flushing

hitaču water lines were flushed from Monday, March 28 to Wednesday, March 30. The first zone was the supply lines leading to the community. The second zone was the upper area of hitaču; Wya Rd, Ju-ma-da Rd, Dominic Rd, Alec Rd, Albert Rd. The third zone was the lower areas of hitaču leading to the entrance of the community; hitaču Rd, Hilthsorta Rd, Tzah-dus Rd, Up-be-ars Rd, Gwi-yim-da Rd. *Åeekoo to Jordan and Henry for their work!*

Early March the Ven-tech Dive Crew serviced the water tower, which included a dive into the reservoir. Ven-Tech Subsea is a Canadian based commercial diving company that provides Underwater Construction and Underwater Inspection Services. All of Ven-Tech Subsea's associated in-tank equipment and divers are fully disinfected according to AWWA Standard C65c-02 prior to each dive

What is AWWA Standard C65c-02?

All work can be performed while a system is full and operating in a normal manner, eliminating downtime and loss of storage capacity. This standard for disinfection of water-storage facilities describes materials, facility preparation, application of disinfectant to interior surfaces of facilities, and sampling and testing for the presence of coliform bacteria. The standard also includes disinfection procedures for underwater inspection of on-line, potable-water-storage facilities.

Advisory Still In Effect

On March 4, 2022, a letter from the First Nations Health Authority on behalf of Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government was distributed to hitaċu residents and re-issued March 18, 2022. The Notices instructed to not use drinking water to prepare formula for bottle-fed infants due to higher manganese levels in the water, based on a new recommendation from the Health Authority. This advisory is still in place.

We ask citizens to use an alternate source of safe drinking water for preparing formula for infants such as bottled water or other safe source. Water can still be used for:

- Consumption (cooking and drinking) by non-vulnerable groups
- hand washing
- · bathing and showering

Remember:

- Feeling or getting ill is not a side effect of manganese.
- Manganese will not affect you right away, but over a longer period of exposure it can affect those under the age of 2. This advisory has recently been added to the Canadian drinking water standards.









- With pregnant and feeding mothers, the body should be able to regulate the levels of manganese well, those concerned can switch water sources. If you have concerns, please speak to your health care provider.
- All those above the age of 2 will not be affected by the current levels of manganese. Should the levels reach cautionary levels, we will notify the community to stop consumption.

hitaċu's water is tested 3-5 times a day at different areas through the community by Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ Government, certified water operators. Samples have been showing optimal levels in the water no signs of bacteria, or ecoli. YG lab results are double checked by a third-party lab. TDS (total dissolved solids) in the system has been low to mid 50s which is near perfect drinking water, TDS level between 50-150 is considered as the most suitable and acceptable for consumption and safe water.

We apologize for the inconvenience to the community. We will continue to test the water and only advice infants are not to be fed tap water (or boiled tap water), all other residents of hitacu, the water is safe to consume.



Yuułu?ił?ath Government - Ucluelet First Nation, hitaću Co-hosting Virtual High Ground Hike

Tsunamis are unpredictable and can strike at any time. When they're caused by far-away events, like the volcano eruption in Tonga on January 15, there's extra time to react. But when an earthquake happens along our coast, we need to respond immediately. If you feel shaking, drop, cover, and hold on. Once the shaking stops, move inland to our tsunami-safe location.

A tsunami caused by a Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake could hit the B.C. coast in as little as 15 minutes, which is why it's critical to practice getting to high ground. A prepared community is a resilient community.

Yuulu?il?ath Government is joining several coastal and Island communities, from Stewart to Victoria, in hosting Virtual High Ground Hikes and a selfie contest during Tsunami Preparedness Week, **April 10 - 16!** We hope to see lots of selfies from our tsunami-safe (high ground) location.

The event, coordinated by PreparedBC and co-hosted by Yuulu?il?ath Government encourages residents to take a first step in preparing for a tsunami and have some fun in the process. It's easy to participate, and when you enter the **#HighGroundSelfie22** contest, you could win one of 47 prizes from PreparedBC.

It's a good idea for everyone in your household--including pets--to have grab-and-go bags. It's a small emergency kit that's easy to take with you in case you need to leave right away. Consider having them for your home, workplace, and vehicle. They should contain:

- Food (ready to eat) and water Phone charger and battery bank, extra batteries
- Small battery-powered or hand-crank radio
- Battery-powered or hand-crank flashlight
- Small first-aid kit and personal medications Personal toiletries and items, such as an extra pair of glasses or contact lenses

Copy of your emergency plan

Copies of important documents, such as insurance papers and identification

Cash in small bills

- Local map with your family meeting place identified
- Seasonal clothing and an emergency blanket Pen and notepad, whistle

In the event of a tsunami, Yuulu?il?ath Government will keep you informed through social media and door to door notification dependent on time allocation.



Health Services

COVID Isolation Periods and Testing

As of Friday, March 11, 2022, B.C.'s indoor mask order was withdrawn as a mandatory form of PPE, along with eased restrictions on long-term care visitors and gatherings.

Effective **Friday, April 8, 2022,** at 12:01 a.m., the following changes will also be made to public health orders:

- Showing the BC Vaccine Card proof of vaccination to access non-essential events, services and businesses will no longer be required.
- Individual businesses and organizations can choose to continue to require the BC Vaccine Card proof on their premises.
- The remainder of the Workplace Safety Order will be lifted, which means businesses will transition back to communicable disease plans to reduce risk of all communicable disease.
- The requirement for students residing in residence to be fully vaccinated under the Post-secondary Institution Housing COVID-19 Preventative Measures Order will be repealed.

Vaccinations remain the primary layer of protection that has limited severe health outcomes from COVID-19. We continue to suggest wearing your mask in public spaces and venues to ensure the reduced risk in contracting COVID-19.

For hitacu residents we also encourage a 14 day isolation period if you or your household test positive for COVID-19, and work order for YG staff include a 5 day work from home if exposed, have symptoms, or have a general cold.



Pre and Post Natal Sessions in Programming

Group pre-natal sessions were offered to citizens previously through Nuu-chah-nulth Tribal Council (NTC) nurses. Since the separation from the NTC and progress of the huupatu Health Centre, Judy Gleeson, RN has been meeting with pre-natal women individually at the health centre (due to Covid-19 restrictions), since her arrival in May 2021.

Now that there is a window of opportunity, with the lifting of restrictions, Judy is planning to start offering group sessions for pre and post-natal women! The finer details of the program are still underway and we are excited to see this service available at a soon-to-be, future date.

Indigenous Summer Internship Program: Marine Spill Response Technician

Western Canada Marine Response Corporation (WCMRC) is a Transport Canada certified Response Organization, whose mandate is to ensure there is a state of preparedness in place and to minimize the impact when an oil spill occurs. This includes the protection of wildlife, cultural and environmental sensitivities, and the safety of both the responders and the public.

How it Works

WCMRC is hiring Indigenous Interns to work as a deckhand at each of our six response bases – Burnaby, Nanaimo, Sidney, Beecher Bay, Port Alberni and Prince Rupert. The four month (May – August) summer job is a full-time paid position.

Interns will gain valuable work experience in the marine sector and insight into how spill response works on Canada's West Coast.

Who is Eligible?

Applicants should have a high school diploma and a valid driver's license. Small Vessel Operator Proficiency (SVOP), Marine Emergency Duties (MED A1/A3) certificate and Radio Operators Certificate (ROC- M) are considered assets. Candidates should be physically fit for work at sea in calm and rough waters. You must also be willing and able to work outdoors in extreme weather conditions.

Those wishing to apply must be Indigenous (First Nations status or non-status, Métis, Inuit).
