Elder's Lunch Tuesday, September 13

YG Nurses, Judy Gleeson, RN and Simble Kaur, LPN, are partnering with Ucluelet Councilor and Community Paramedic Rachelle Cole and Island Health, to bring the Community Virtual Care program to the hitacu community.

The Community Virtual Care program involves home health monitoring (measurements such as blood pressure, blood saturation and pulse rate) for community members with chronic conditions such as diabetes, chronic kidney disease, chronic lung disease, heart failure, and high blood pressure.

Follow up advice and support is given to patients registered on the program to maintain their optimum wellness.

More information about this program will be given at the next scheduled Elders' Luncheon on **Tuesday, September 13** from **11:30am to 1:00 pm** at the Cix^watin Centre Gymnasium.

Roadside garbage pick up coming to Tla-o-qui-aht and Yuułu?ił?ath communities.

Tla-o-qui-aht First Nation and the Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government will be introducing the Alberni Clayoquot Regional District's (ACRD) residential roadside waste collection service in their communities this fall.

There are currently six large containers placed throughout the First Nation communities, which residents can use to dispose of their household waste. This means that there is no waste separation.

The ACRD launched a West Coast Solid Waste Working Group in 2019 that included representatives from Ucluelet, Tofino, Parks Canada, and Tla-o-qui-aht, Yuułu?ił?ath and Toquaht First Nations. Their goal was to find opportunities to improve waste management in the region.

It has resulted in the introduction of organics to residential waste collection. This new service will divert food and yard waste from landfills, transforming it into "reusable, nutrient-rich compost," the ACRD said in a release.

The nations are anticipating to receive the three-stream roadside collection service for organic waste, recycling and garbage in October, before the program is rolled out more widely across the west coast.

The towns of Tofino and Ucluelet will receive organics pickup for the first time in the fall on a weekly basis. Recycling and garbage collection with alternate on a bi-weekly basis.

Because the nations are receiving the Sort'nGo service for the first time, it is rolling out in the communities six weeks earlier than in Tofino and Ucluelet.

Tla-o-qui-aht First Nation has never had a recycling program within their communities of Opitsaht, Esowista to Ty-Histanis, said Shawn Quick, Tla-o-qui-aht First Nation public works manager.

He attributes it to a "lack of direction, help and understanding."

"Traditionally, we didn't have to worry about our scraps degrading in a harmful way in the ecosystem," he said. "But now we have all these plastics and other pollutants - we have to properly manage them to make sure we don't poison our territory going forward."

Colonial policies that were put in place to "subjugate" Indigenous communities interrupted how waste was traditional-

ly disposed of, he said.

Growing up, Quick said he didn't see any care given to the disposal of waste.

"[The government] put us into little communities that they could manage," he said. "But now they're leaving it to us to take care of ourselves."

Tla-o-qui-aht is now in the midst of learning how to manage different policies and actions, which Quick said includes effective waste removal.

The introduction of recycling and organic waste collection has been a goal of Quick's since he took on his role around five years ago.

"It's about time," he said. "To take care of our waste properly and reduce our impact on our climate."

Quick said organics will be transported for composting to the Tofino airport, recyclables will be brought to the recycling depot in Tofino, and garbage will be brought to the West Coast Landfill.

"It's exciting to see the Tla-o-qui-aht First Nation and Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government lead the way on the west coast with the expansion of the ACRD's three-stream Sort'nGo program," said Josie Osborne, MLA for Mid Island-Pacific Rim. "This service gives families another tool to reduce impacts on the environment and makes our west coast communities a healthier plan to work, live, and play."

Residents can expect to receive new collection carts for organics, recycling and garbage ahead of the program's launch, according to the ACRD.

The ACRD received a \$6 million grant in 2020 to introduce organics collection to the region through the Canada Community Building Fund. In 2021, the Sort'nGo program was kicked off in Port Alberni.

"The Sort'nGo service will be a large change for the residents of Hitaċu – for decades we've relied on community dumpsters that many are used to using for discarding waste at leisure," said Spencer Touchie, Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ assets manager. "This new change in providing a weekly service, offering organics, recycling, and waste removal, will help us move forward in a more sustainable way."

As Yuułu?ił?atḥ nears the launch, Touchie said the nation is working with the ACRD to offer information sessions and packages to hitaċu residents.

"Organic waste diversion is a huge priority for all of us," said ACRD Board Chair John Jack. "We'll be working together over the coming months on logistics, education and engagement to ensure a successful pilot project."

Quick said the move is being made to be "appropriate stewards" of the land.

"To ensure we decrease our footprint in the world today, and try to make the best choices [we can] with our solid waste removal," he said.

The Sort n Go Program will start in the Fall of 2022, community engagement sessions will take place, in addition to the Community Educator visiting households. Many questions have risen in respect to bear safe bins, Spencer Touchie has

been working diligently to find a solution to offer additional bear smart outdoor storage.

Yuułu?ił?ath Elects Asya Touchie as Member of Legislature!

Asya Touchie was elected to the Legislature after running a campaign that focused on transparency, accountability and the meaningful involvement of citizens in government decision-making. Asya received approximately 67 percent of the votes cast in the July 4, 2022, by-election and has hit the ground running as the Legislature's current term moves through its final year. Asya grew up in Nanaimo, BC, with her siblings Larissa Touchie, Matthew Touchie Jr., Brian Touchie, and Wanda Touchie and her parents Leah Golling and Matthew Touchie Sr. Asya's grandparents are Edith Brown (Touchie), Matthew Brown and Mary Ida Cardinal.

Asya Touchie has spent time on Vancouver Island, including living in Victoria and Ucluelet. In Victoria, Asya completed her Bachelor of Child and Youth Care in 2015. After completing her degree, she began working as a Social Worker with a Delegated Aboriginal Agency. "Supporting Aboriginal children, youth and families to reach their goals was so rewarding. It felt good going home each day knowing that I was doing work in a good way". Asya made the tough decision to

leave her job as a Social Worker to move to Ucluelet in 2017 to support the Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government as the Manager of Culture & Heritage and the Manager of Social Services. "The Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government supported me throughout my education, and I felt compelled to give back to the government and citizens." She has since gone on to complete additional educational goals, including a Certificate in Indigenous Language Proficiency and a Master's in Public Administration, both from the University of Victoria.

Asya spent just under 2 years managing the Department of Culture & Heritage and the Department of Social Services. She noted how clear it was that the work of our government and community is about people building on the work of those who have come before them, and she saw her role in the Department of Culture & Heritage as part of this process. "It was a privilege to be selected as the first Manager of Culture & Heritage. I was able to spend time with our elders, built upon our Language Nest and Adult Language programs, and laid the foundations for bringing our artifacts home". Since leaving her positions at the Yuułu?ił?ath Government, Asya

has begun working within post-secondary institutions, including Simon Fraser University, where she supported Indigenous students attending the university, and the University of Calgary, where she is supporting Indigenous students to reach their academic goals through academic upgrading and develops Indigenous programs to support the path to reconciliation.

"We have a democracy; one with the recognition and powers needed to allow our people to exist independently yet equally within Canadian society, surrounded by our distinct culture, and in communities that are healthy, safe and prosperous." Asya believes that to achieve this, it is crucial that our government, and its decisions, reflect the needs of our people. This requires transparency in government, the meaningful engagement of the public when the government is making decisions and effective communication between citizens and their elected officials to ensure that the priorities of the government are the priorities of the people. "We have to make sure that no one is left behind while we do this work and that as we promote positive change, we do so in a way that ensures that change is felt equally, with a focus on those most in need; this is what will deliver us a community that is cohesive, healthy, and sustainable." She is very interested to hear from citizens and encourages them to reach out to her at asya.touchie@ufn.ca. 
