This location is the future site of the new

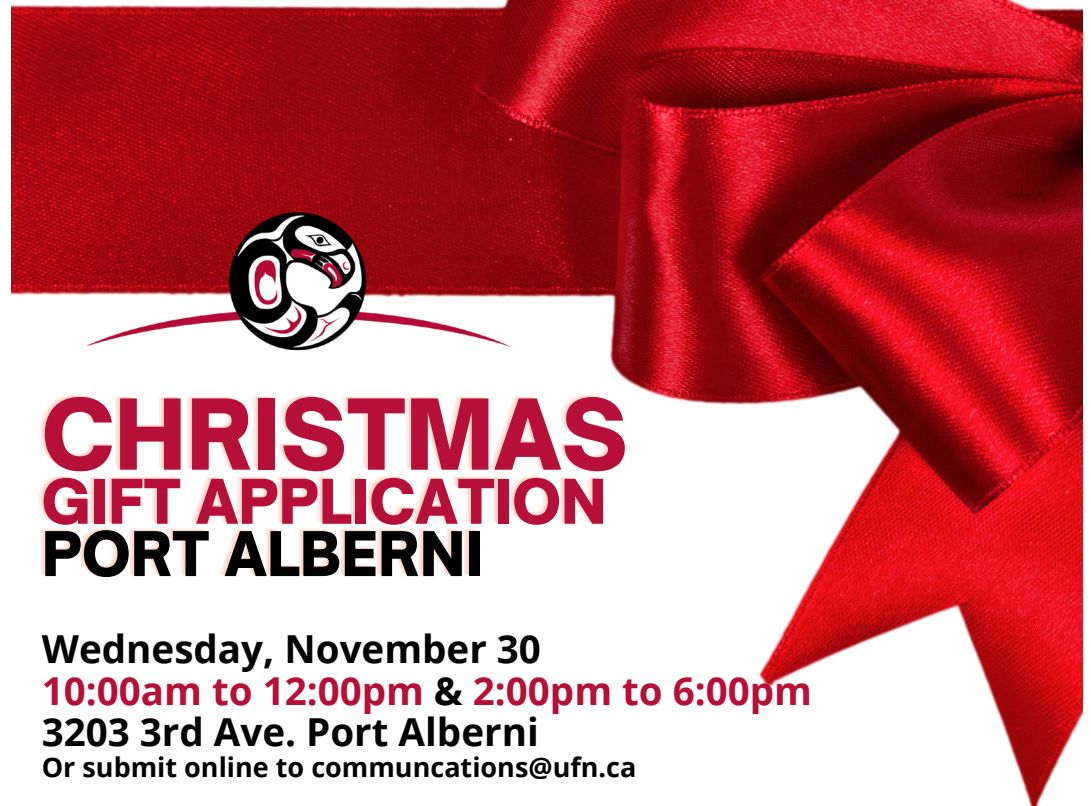
Urban Office, which is currently under renovations. We look forward to offering you a sneak peek, but will hold an open house when the Centre officially opens.

Canadian Firearms Safety Course for Non-Restricted Possession Acquisition License (P.A.L.) Course to be offered in hitaču!

The Canadian Firearms Safety Course for Non-Restricted Possession Acquisition License (P.A.L.) Course is being offered in hitaču for up to 6 members on **Thursday, December 1** and **Friday, December 2** from **8:00am to 5:00pm**.

What to expect for the P.A.L. Course:

- After the in-class instruction, you will do a written and practical test.
- Anyone 12 years or older can take the CFSC.
- Youth under 12 can take the course, but only for educational purposes; they will not do the written or practical exams.
- A firearms licence shows that the licence holder can possess and use firearms.
- If you are in possession of a firearm, you need a licence even if you are not the owner and never handle the firearm.
- If a peace officer finds that you have a firearm without a valid licence, you risk penalties.
- To reduce that risk, you should apply for a licence as quickly as possible.

Taking the P.A.L. Course:

Reminder on Harvestable Species

Every person with Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ hunting documentation has right to harvest wildlife and migratory birds within the Maa-nulth Wildlife Harvest Area and Maa-nulth Migratory Birds Harvest Area. Harvesters must comply with every condition of that Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ hunting documentation.

The following wildlife may **NOT** be harvested under the right to harvest wildlife during the following times:

- Elk (no allocation)
- Deer between January 1 and September 1
- Female bears, female cougars or female wolves at any time when they are in the company of, or reasonably can be expected to be caring for, dependent young.

A person must **NOT** harvest wildlife or migratory birds under the right to harvest, within 400 metres of an occupied dwelling.

Kennedy Hill Update

Kennedy Hill will open to two-way traffic this winter.

Two-way traffic will start flowing again this winter on the Kennedy Hill section of Highway 4, reducing delays for people travelling between Port Alberni and the west coast of Vancouver Island.

Weather permitting, both lanes may be open by early in the new year.

This is a major milestone of the project to upgrade the 1.5-kilometre Kennedy Hill section to a safer, more reliable road for residents, tourists and truckers. The road has been straightened and flattened, with better visibility, wider travel lanes and shoulders, and new roadside barriers between the highway and Kennedy Lake.

The project, which is now more than 90% complete, has removed overhanging rock, which was a hazard for commercial vehicles and a source of rockfalls onto the highway. A new rest area with washroom facilities and viewpoint will be accessible for all vehicle types. An improved drainage system will meet new standards that increase resiliency to the changing climate.

When both lanes are open, traffic impacts will be reduced to nighttime closures and minor interruptions during the day while the contractor continues to work toward final project completion in the spring. Conditions will be updated on DriveBC.

Quick Facts:

The Kennedy Hill project includes:
blasting 180,000 cubic metres of rock on the bluffs and road base;
drilling rock stabilization bolts into the hillside, which would measure seven kilometres if laid in a straight line;
installing retaining structures downslope from the highway to the lakeside; and
building two cantilever structures to widen the road.
Total project cost is approximately \$54 million.

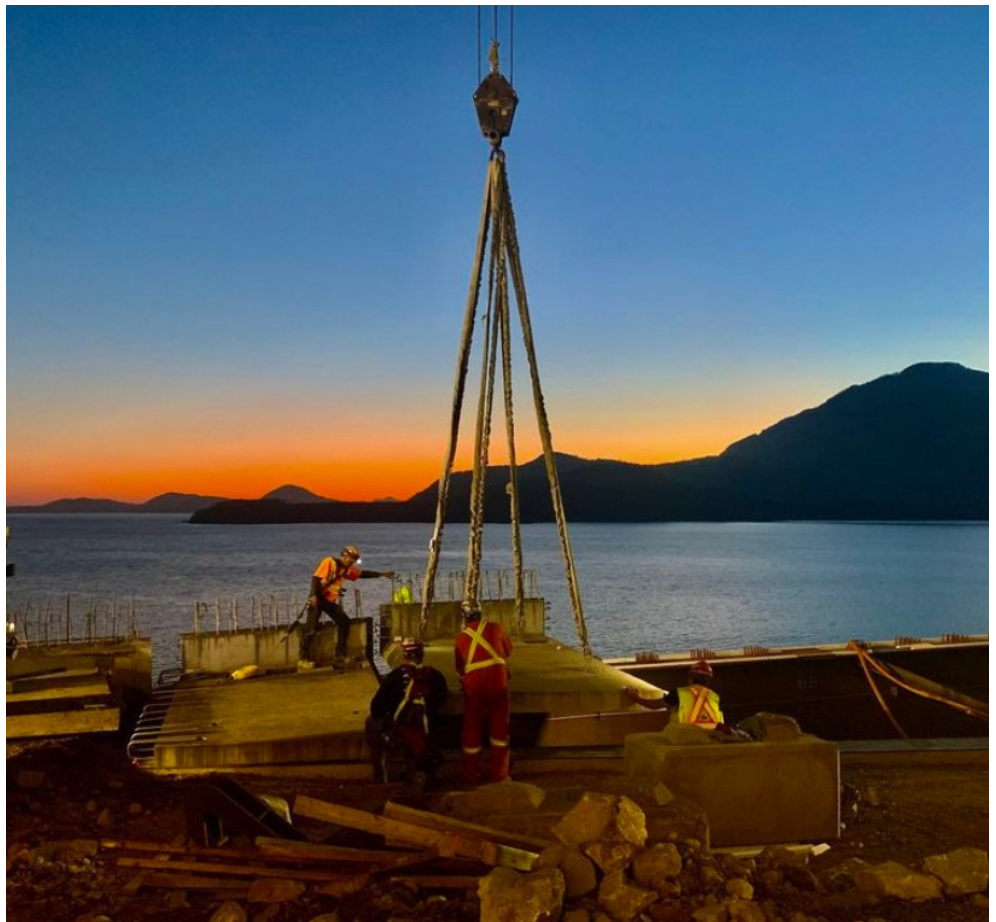

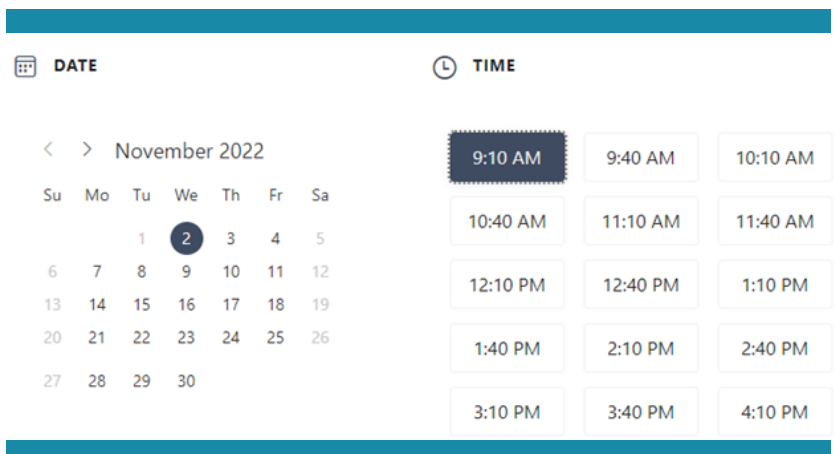

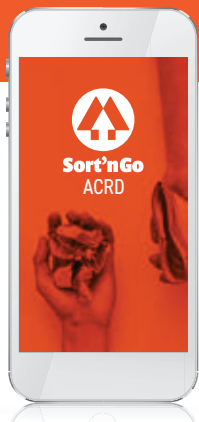

Being Bear Smart

Residents are already dealing with pests and wildlife in their garbage – and managing the new organics collection service will require continued attention to prevent interactions with animals.

Check out the tips outlined below to reduce interactions, help our bears stay wild and keep pests out.

Certified Wildlife-Resistant Locking Mechanisms

The new organics and garbage carts come with certified locking mechanisms to further reduce the chance of wildlife accessing the contents.

TIP TO 'BEAR IN MIND': Keep the locking mechanisms clasped to the cart lids throughout the week. When setting out carts for pickup, unclasp clips from the lid and hook the ends together. This will keep them from swinging loose and damaging your carts as they're emptied into the truck.



Best Practices for Cart Storage

Like all garbage receptacles, the (green) organic waste carts is best kept in a bear-resistant location, except during the day of pickup. Keeping waste inside is ideal – such as inside a garage or shed.

Carts stored outside need to be properly secured. This is the #1 reason animals are able to get access, damage carts and increase the risk of human-wildlife conflict.

Guidelines from WildsafeBC include:

- All types of outdoor sheds are not strong enough to prevent bears from accessing their contents – unless they are outfitted with electrical fencing.
- Secure carts with chains or cables locks to a secure base, such as a concrete block.
- Store carts in a well-lit area, or area with security/motion sensor lights – keep carts away from entryways and doors.
- If possible, decrease odor attractants by storing food waste in the freezer before transferring to green carts on collection day.

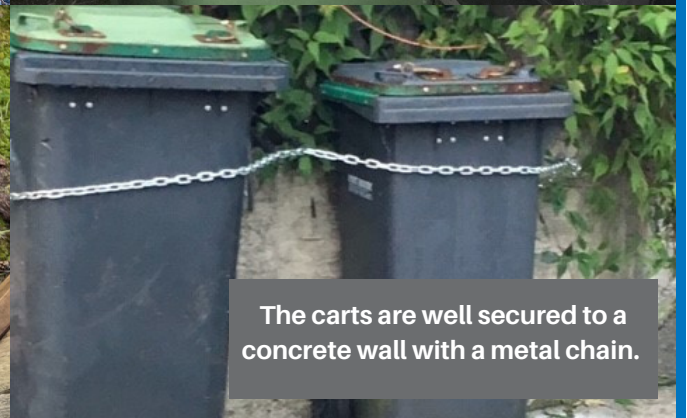
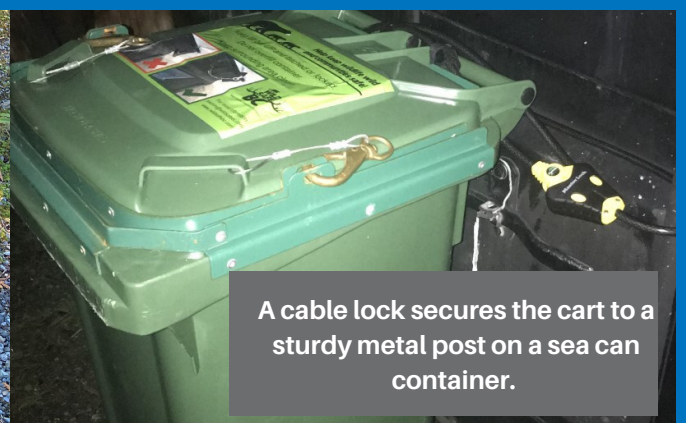
Help keep bears wild!

Always secure & anchor your cart

The best option is to keep your carts inside your home. If that is not possible, these bear-resistant carts can be stored outdoors as long as they are secured (with both clips on top) and well anchored to prevent an adult bear from being able to drag them away.

Do not store these carts in a shed or outdoor structure unless it is certified bear-resistant or has a well-maintained electric fence around the perimeter.

Here are a few ways to anchor your carts









Bear-resistant garbage carts

Note that the bear-resistant carts provided are **NOT BEAR-PROOF**. Given enough time and motivation, a black bear can cause serious damage and eventually access the contents.

Black bears that learn to access containers may continue to cause more damage and get into conflict with people, which then leads to safety concerns and the potential death of that bear.

Help keep bears wild!

-  Keep your carts in a secure location (inside your home is best). Note that bears can easily tear apart a shed.
-  If you are unable to keep it inside, anchor your carts securely to ensure an adult bear cannot drag them away.
-  Always keep the clips latched until the morning of collection.
-  Freeze smelly items until the morning of collection.
-  Only put your carts curbside on the morning of collection.
-  Rise your recycling thoroughly as the recycling cart is not bear-resistant (dirty recycling can attract a bear).

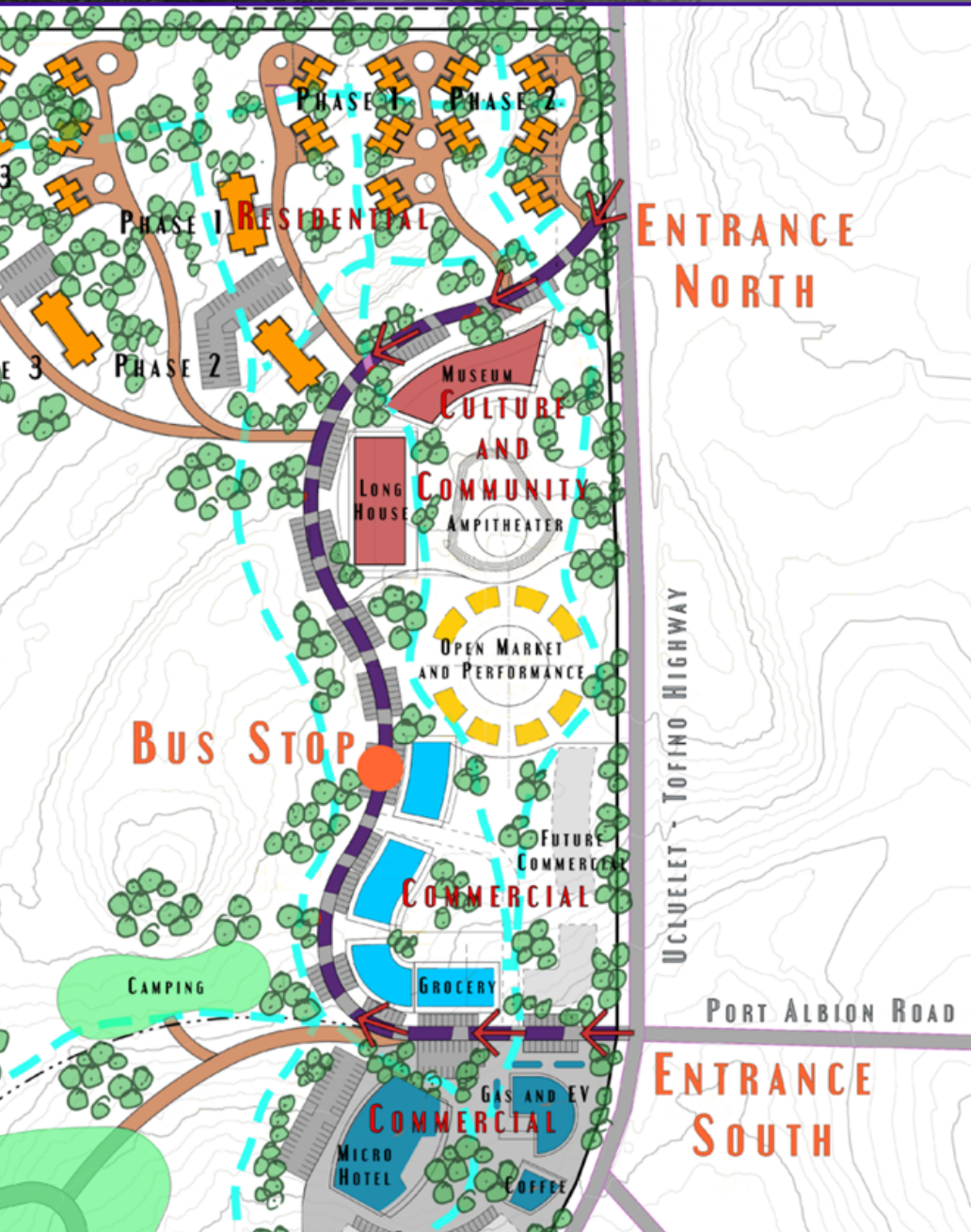

Economic Development

Economic Development Officer, Corey Rich, thanks citizens for engaging.

The Economic Development Officer would like to thank those citizens who participated in the October 17th, 2022, hitaču Assembly. The turnout was positive, and our government was able to share some of the work currently underway by the Economic Development Committee.

At this year's assembly, Corey Rich, the Economic Development Officer shared some new updates with the community and was available for discussions. Highlights from the year's work include a Master Planning project funded by Indigenous Services Canada, and presentations with business research identifying the type of projects we can make happen here within Treaty Settlement Lands.

Messaging that was front and center at the display table was how we benefit when we dream big because this allows us to build unity and a clear understanding of where we are trying to get to in the next decade and beyond. A planning approach with scale helps us set essential goals for our shared future, and these goals guide our planning actions which answer key questions about how we will get there one day.

On June 8th, 2022 the first version of the Master Plan was shared with the Executives by the Economic Development Committee. This group is a special government committee tasked to report on where and how projects may create new jobs, generate property tax, generate other tax revenues, and facilitate compounding economic activity. The mem-

bers of the Nations Economic Development Committee include Jenny Touchie (voting member), Larry Baird (voting member), Marina Rayner (voting member), Karen Serverinson (voting member newly appointed), President Charles McCarthy (non-voting member), Spencer Touchie (non-voting member) and Corey Rich, EDO (non-voting member).

The Executives advised the Economic Development Committee and Officer to proceed with citizen engagement. Our government values citizen engagement, and we are taking the time to move through an essential process with good intentions. We know citizens have been interested in Economic Development, and we are encouraging their participation in these events. Below are some early concepts for the mixed-use land development on our lands zoned CD2.

The land site scale is approximately 30 acres in size and could, within 5-20 years, predictably host growing business amenities and new market-rate housing. The Economic Development Committee will work this year to calculate the total net economic development benefits, which weigh the investment costs required to expand a vital growing economy within our Treaty Settlement Lands. This is part of the bigger picture and feasibility study.

If you missed this years Annual General Assembly and the display presentation, we are planning for additional community engagement sessions. Stay tuned for future dates in the New Year.

USS Student, Parent & Teacher Gatherings

Ucluelet Secondary School is thankful to be back to pre-COVID policies and procedures and once again can open our doors to families. With this in mind, USS will be holding the first staff, student, and family gathering in two years over the course of two afternoons at USS.

'Tis the season for scammers! Below are tips to help you and your family navigate call and email scammers.

- Be suspicious of unknown callers even from local numbers.
- Avoid offering banking information, social insurance numbers, or general personal information over the phone, a reputable source will have your information.
- Be wary of anyone calling to buy or sell land, questions about taxes, pretending to be a bank or a government entity, especially if you are not expected a call.
- Avoid instructions that ask: 'Press 1 to be removed from the call list'.
- Avoid 'You won', 'Click here to collect your prize' or 'Click here to unsubscribe' (email).
- Double check emails for unknown web addresses or google the web address if you are unsure.
