Gwaii Engineering Visits hitaċu



Gwaii Engineering representatives were in hitaću on Wednesday, December 14 to start open discussions on the hitaću tašii Multi-Use Trail Project. The engagement sessions were broken up into two segments for the day, beginning with an Elder's Luncheon and followed by a general Community Open House.

Joining us from Gwaii Engineering was Mike Achtem, Senior Engineer; Julia Barron, Project Engineer; and Ame-Lia Tamburrini from Hum Consulting (pictured below right).

The purpose of the sessions were to consult the community with the project attributes, showcase maps of design areas, and gather feedback from the community with needs, priorities, and even safety concerns for a future pathways.

Feedback that was provided included, accessibility for elders, lighting arrangements, potential slip and fall areas





during winter, areas for lookout and seating, and more.

Surveys were distributed to the community prior to the information date and are still available online at **ufn.ca > Government > Forms > Assets Management**, as well available for pick up at Cix^watin Centre Reception.

The next Community Engagement/Information session will be held on **Wednesday, February 1 from 5:00pm to 7:00pm**. A dinner will be held for the community with a presentation. The presentation will include project details, feedback provided to date, and an open floor discussion.

We have a few months left of winter and that includes wind storms! Power outages can happen anytime during the year, somteimes without warning. Make sure you have an emergency plan and emergency kit with supplies to support your household for three days to a week:

Emergency Kit Supply List

Put supplies in one or 2 containers, such as plastic bins or duffel bags. Store them in an area of your home that's easy to get to, such as a hall closet, spare room or garage.

- Non-perishable food: minimum three-day to oneweek supply, with a manual can opener
- Water: four litres per person, per day for drinking and sanitation
- Phone charger, power bank or inverter
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio
- Battery-powered or hand-crank flashlight
- Extra batteries
- First-aid kit and medications
- Personal toiletries and items, such as an extra pair of glasses or contact lenses
- Copy of your emergency plan
- Copies of important documents, such as insurance papers and identification
- Cash in small bills
- Garbage bags and moist towelettes for personal sanitation
- Seasonal clothing, sturdy footwear and emergency blanket
- Dust masks
- Whistle
- Help/OK Sign (PDF): Display the appropriate side outward in your window during a disaster.
- Have plenty of water

Water Recommendations

Most people need four litres of water per person per day, but some people may need more. For example, children, people who are nursing or people who are sick. Hot temperatures can double water needs.

Pets need about 30 ml of water per kg of body weight per day. For example, a cat or small dog needs at least half a cup of water each day.

Water must be safe to drink! Purchase bottled water for an emergency kit. Keep it in its original container in cool and dark place that's easy to reach.

When keeping an emergency supply of water, try not to:

- Open the water until you need it
- Use water that's past the expiry or "best before" date printed on the bottle
- Use water from toilet tanks or bowls, radiators, waterbeds, swimming pools or spas.

Your emergency kit can also be your grab-and-go bag. A grab-and-go bag is a small emergency kit that's easy to take with you in case you need to leave home due to hazards such as:

- floods
- tsunamis
- landslides
- wildfires

Forestry Opportunities


The Yuułu?ił?atḥ Government has forestry employment opportunities available for citizens!

- Limb Pickers, including supply of skiff for pulling limbs to shore. Work includes boating to, in and around heli water drop zones to round up limbs and debris from yarding operations, then towing limbs to disposal site and disposing of limbs as appropriate and/or discussed with management. Estimated timelines: February March 2023, intermittent as required. Hourly camp work based out of Effingham Inlet.
- **Push-Off Operator** at dump, including possible supply of push off machine (e.g. 200 300 sized log loader). Work includes operating push off machine at dump during load and

haul operations to push bundled loads into the booming grounds. Estimated timelines: February - March 2023, intermittent during load and haul operations. Hourly camp work based out of Effingham Inlet.

• Landing Bucker. Work includes bucking merch logs to grade at landings as per provided quality specs. Must own and operate saws, wedges, and applicable gear. Estimated timelines: February - March 2023. Hourly camp work based out of Effingham Inlet.






