PRESIDENT HIGHLIGHTS

 The LCAC (Lands Claims Agreement Coalition) recently attended meetings with Canada, including cabinet ministers, to:

- Address concerns that non-treaty Nations can obtain rights took us treaties to obtain.
- Advocate for the passage of an act through Parliament that will clearly state that all federal laws are to be interpreted to uphold the Aboriginal and treaty rights of the Indigenous peoples of Canada, and not invalidate them.
- Advocate for the establishment by Parliament for a Commissioner of Modern Treaty Implementation (CMTI) who will report to Parliament on the status of implementation of Treaties – this will enhance accountability on Canada to meet their treaty commitments – we've been pushing for this for over 20 years – finally looks like it will occur.
- In February, attended the Alliance of BC Modern Treaty Nations annual leadership meeting and the AGM of the Alliance's Society. The Society was recently created to enable the Alliance Nations to obtain funding directly from BC, have staff and enable greater advocacy for the eight Modern Treaty Nations within BC. The Society obtained \$1.5 million over 2 years.
- As the BC Government reviews its legislation to be consistent with UNDRIP, we need to ensure that our Treaty rights are not eroded, and that YG's voice and positions are heard by BC and other Nations. We created a new department in January Intergovernmental Affairs, with staff expected to grow to four by September. All positions will be funded by Government grants.
- Currently in negotiations with Canada through the Self-Governing Indigenous Governments group to obtain committed long-term funding for Lands, Resources & Treaty Management, Infrastructure, and Language, Culture and Heritage.

- We obtained support from the District of Ucluelet for our request to BC for joint management with BC of our foreshore in the inlet - we expect that negotiations with BC will take another year.
- Given Ucluelet is Yuułu?ił?atḥ traditional territory, our staff is currently developing a draft relationship agreement with the District of Ucluelet for the Executive to consider.

LANDS AND RESOURCES PORTFOLIO HIGHLIGHTS

- On February 29, YG received \$19,026,566.00 for the settlement of a specific claim under Canada's Specific Claims Policy related to Canada's mismanagement of timber on former Yuułu?ił?atḥ Indian Reserves. The funds are currently being held in an interest-bearing bank account until such time that new legislation and investment management and policies are finalized to oversee the disbursement of funds for specified purposes. Engagements with citizens on the draft legislation are anticipated to take place in April.
- Projects for the Salish Sea Initiative have been ongoing. The 36' Landing craft is expected to arrive this month. Funding in the 2024/2025 fiscal year is confirmed to receive \$300,000.
- The Joint Fisheries Committee (JFC) with Maa-nulth Nations and Canada determined that we used the full underage for sockeye and were slightly under other species.
- In partnership with Forsite Consultants, we are developing an Integrated Resource
 Management Plan (IRMP) to support land and resource management within the traditional
 territory. A conservation Network will be established to further integrate and connect
 ecological, cultural, and social values. Next steps will be community engagement and
 developing practices to inform future forest management planning and practices.
- We are collaborating closely with the Ministry of Forests to continue our efforts in obtaining a First Nations Woodlot License in the Arrowsmith TSA and in the Kennedy Lake area
- Ministry of Forests has offered YG a First Nations Opportunity agreement (FTOA) which is the undercut volume of 80,000 m3 from the Interfor license in Arrowsmith TSA.

The winter is nearly over and I for one am looking forward to a very productive spring and summer for the Yuułu?i?atḥ Government. We've made a lot of progress in the Department of Culture and Heritage recently and I'm pleased to share some highlights.

We are continuing to work with the Royal British Columbia Museum to repatriate Yuułu?i?atḥ artifacts. We are anticipating the return of additional artifacts later this year and are assessing opportunities to take ownership of items while they remain in the museum until we are able to bring them home. We have heard from citizens and elders about this important work and look forward to continuing this engagement as a central part of our repatriation efforts.

I'm pleased to share that the baby welcoming will be returning to hitaću in the spring. We last hosted this event in 2018 and it was such a valuable opportunity for citizens to connect with each other and with our culture. And of course, it's going to be wonderful welcoming and celebrating a new generation of Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ.

The canoe log that was located in Ucluelet has been returned to hitaću. This is the start of the new cultural outdoor space that will be located next to the mini big house. I am excited to see the progress and to have citizens gather in the space.

Unfortunately, Ahousaht will no longer be a destination for Tribal Canoe Journeys this year. However, work is underway to launch our own Yuułu?i?atḥ canoe paddle that will involve travelling around the Ucluelet area. Stay tuned for more information on this exciting opportunity!

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PART 1 - INTRODUCTORY PROVISIONS

Short title

1.1 This Act may be cited as the Annual Budget Act, 2024-2025, YFNS 85/2024.

Executive oversight

1.2 The member of the Executive holding the finance portfolio is responsible for the executive oversight of this Act.

Adoption of annual budget

1.3 The annual budget attached as Schedule 1 is adopted for the 2024-2025 fiscal year.

Commencement

1.4 This Act comes into force on the date it is enacted.

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NOTES to Budget/Multi-year Plan

The YG recently created an updated strategic plan from directives obtained through extensive community input and government review. The 2025 budget/financial plan is informed by the strategic priorities established by the Executive out of the strategic plan. The budget/multi-year plans will more closely reflect the government's strategic plan.

2025 - 2029 FINANCIAL PLAN (Multi-Year Plan):

REVENUE:

The Fiscal Financing Agreement (FFA) is the government's main source of operating (core) funding and is from Canada. The current agreement is expected to be renewed or extended in 2026. Total 'core' funding in the FFA 2025 is \$8,1MM to fund 'core' government programmes. Expenditures for 'core' YG programmes exceed this and are drawn from other annual funding.

Other' revenues within the FFA include additional infrastructure funding to support housing and other infrastructure maintenance and growth (e.g., community buildings, water/waste water, roads).

RRS, or Resource Revenue Sharing agreements are in place with Canada and British Columbia. These include logging and transaction taxation revenues (G/PST) as determined annually by contractual formulae. The recent resinstatement of Section 87 tax exemption for Maanulth Treaty Nations, is reflected in reduced revenues from sales taxes.

Forgiveness of Treaty Negotiation debt is the repayment of former loan payments by the Yuulu ?it?ath Government (YG) to Canada which were incurred for treaty negotiation. Canada has waived the obligation to repay these loans and past payments are being reimbursed to the YG by Canada. These annual payments will end in 2025. Most of these funds have been set aside into reserves for future strategic expenditure.

FNBC First Nations **BC** Gaming revenues are received through the partnership of BCFNs from BC gaming revenue sharing annually. Most of these annual funds have been set aside for future expenditure.

Annual Implementation fund investment returns are the planned withdrawals from the implementation fund investments in accordance with the Statement of Investment Policy to support the costs of governance and programming as a treaty nation under the 2011 FFA Schedule D. In Budget 2024-2025 these have been allocated to the Culture, Language and Heritage department, which is currently not funded under the FFA with Canada.

Deferred revenue is grant funding received in past fiscal years which was not fully expended. Based on funding agreements these funds are rolled into following fiscal years for use as intended. Budget includes estimates only, total \$2.9MM to 2025.

Proceeds from settlement claims are undetermined, but estimated here for recognition in the year expected. These are legal settlements from Canada for specific claims. The current intent is to set these aside for future/ongoing uses as yet to be finalised, but in accordance with the strategic plan.

Transfers from Reserves include both statutory (legally required, such as the Tangible Capital Assets) reserves and internally restricted reserves (those prior year surpluses or unrestricted funds that have been formally set aside by the YG). These reserves are generally pulled into the budget to cover expenditures as intended/regulated.

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Gap funding is intended for use in housing repairs and community infrastructure development Forgiveness of Debt is the recovery of former loan payments made to Canada by YG to repay Infrastructure/Life Cycle/Housing Investment Capital is other FFA funding - now annual

EXPENDITURES:

Currently, the costs of ongoing annual core services are combined with other short term projects. Future budgets will show the core operating and special/one-time projects separately.

Bank debt annual repayments total approximately \$405,000 in 2025. The most significant loan is about \$4MM for the cixwatin community building. CMHC-ANTCo low interest loans fully paid by social housing rents and subsidies, about \$220,000/year.

Inflation: the consumer price index, or CPI, per Statistics Canada, September 2022 to September 2023, was 3.2-3.8%, a much lower year-over-year increase than the prior year. Because of the cyclical variations in inflation this rate informs cost estimates, but is not directly applied. For example, a general estimate of 3% was used throughout the budgeting process for 2024-2025, due to the falling inflation rate.

Payroll: In budget year 2024-2025 the *proposed* (not yet approved) addition of several new staff positions is included for budgeting purposes. Along with the inflation-informed increases proposed, the budgeted payroll increases by about 15% over the 2024 budget. About \$2.1MM of PR costs are funded by non-core or external grants.

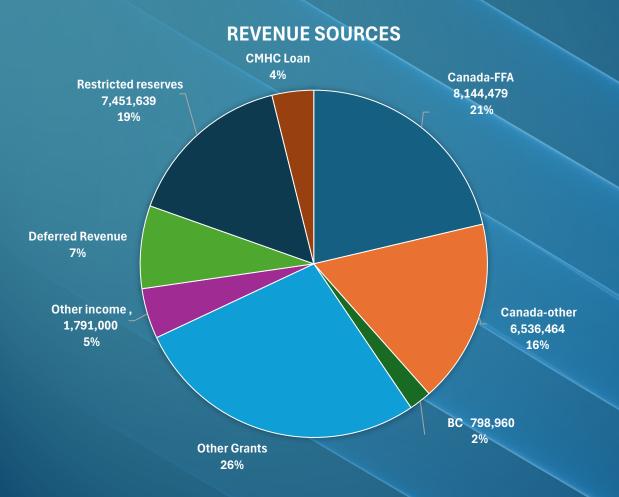

- ► Financial Administration Act (YFNS6/2011)
 - ► Fiscal year: April 1 to March 31
 - ► March 31: Deadline for Legislature to approve:
 - Annual Budget for next year
 - ► Multi-year financial plan including Annual Budget and following 4 years
 - ▶ By January 30: CFO submits the multi-year plan & budget to Legislature and finance committee
 - ▶ By February 15: finance committee reviews and makes recommendations to Legislature
 - ▶ By March 1: Legislature presents the draft annual budget to the hitac'u Assembly

▶ Budget process in brief:

- STRATEGIC PLAN mid- to long-term goals from citizens and government input
 - Strategic Priorities from the plan are reviewed annually by the Executive
 - Managers create workplans and review/confirm with Executive portfolio holders,
 followed by the Director of Operations & CFO
- ► ANNUAL BUDGET— near term *financial* plan supports strategic priorities + day to day programme administration
 - Managers create budget & multi-year plans from their confirmed workplans
 - ► CFO balances budget, allocating funding to proposed expenditures according to funding arrangements and ensuring funding sources cover expenditures
- ► MULTI-YEAR FINANCIAL PLAN— 5-year financial priorities reflect strategic goals

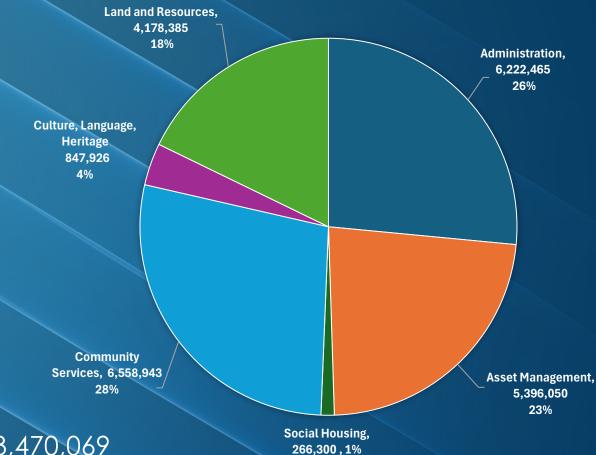

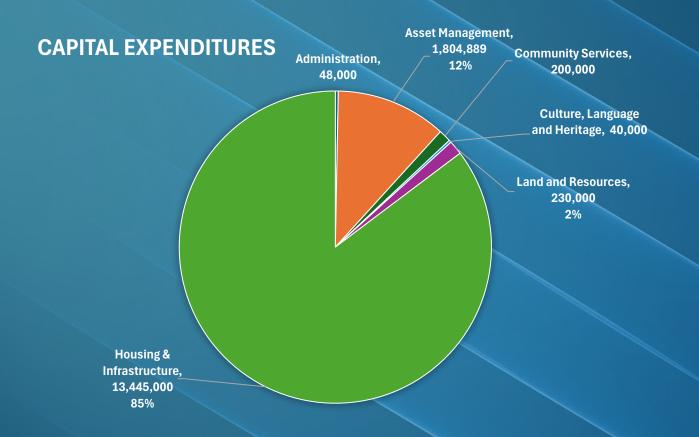
