HITAĆU ASSEMBLY - KEY RULES OF ORDER

Adoption of the agenda and what it means:

When the hitaću assembly starts, an adoption of the agenda will be called by the Chairperson. At this time, Yuuľu?iľ?atĥ citizens may suggest (propose) additional agenda items. Government Act, 4.6(b).

The adoption of the agenda, with the addition (inclusion) or rejection (exclusion) of additional agenda items presented by the citizens, will be determined by approval of a motion. The approval of a motion is achieved by a majority of the eligible voters (citizens) present and voting. Government Act, 4.6(c).

Assembly Meeting Example:

Motion: The Chairperson will call for a voter (citizen) to “move” a motion to adopt the agenda as presented [or as amended with additions]. This is done by a raise of the hand, in person or on zoom. Any eligible voter can raise their hand to move the adoption of the agenda.

Second: Once the motion is moved, the Chairperson will look for a voter (citizen) to “second” the motion. This is done by a raise of the hand, in person or on zoom. Any eligible voter can raise their hand to move the adoption of the agenda.

Vote: The Chairperson will put the motion to a vote by asking voters (citizens) if they are in favour or opposed of the agenda. If a majority of the eligible voters vote in favour, the motion is carried, and the agenda is adopted. This allows for the meeting to proceed. IF the majority is opposed to the agenda items, the meeting will end.

What happens next?

- The Chairperson must follow (adhere to) the agenda adopted. Government Act 4.6(d).
- The Chairperson must allow (afford) a representative of the Yuuľu?iľ?atĥ Government the opportunity to make a report or presentation on each agenda item. Government Act, 4.6(e).
- Following any presentation or report, citizens will be allowed (permitted the opportunity) to raise questions or ask for (seek) clarification in relation to that specific agenda item. Government Act, 4.6(f).
- Each speaker (citizen) will be permitted a maximum of five minutes to ask (frame) a question or make a statement. The Chairperson must recognize an individual to respond to the question or call on a new speaker (citizen). Government Act, 4.6(i).
- If the original speaker (citizen) wishes to continue the topic or raise a following (subsequent) question, the Chairperson must place that speaker (citizen) at the end of the speakers list. Government Act, 4.6(j).
- All questions and discussions must be presented and spoken (advanced) in a respectful manner. Government Act, 4.6(g).
- A speaker (citizen) may make a motion to get (obtain) a resolution of the hitaću assembly on the agenda item being addressed which would constitute a recommendation to the Yuuľu?iľ?atĥ Government. Government Act, 4.7(a).
- Every Yuuľu?iľ?atĥ citizen that is (has attained) the age of 16 has the right to vote on any resolution presented at the hitaću assembly. Constitution, 2.29.
- The chairperson must maintain order at a meeting of the hitaću assembly and has the authority to rule any speaker out of order or remove an individual for unruly behavior. Government Act, 4.6(k).

PORTFOLIO HIGHLIGHTS:

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS

BC

- Heritage Conservation Act Transformation Project
 - Work is ongoing on amendments to the Act to better reflect Modern Treaty Nations' priorities and needs. Draft legislative amendments will be presented to YG in the coming months for review and comment.
- BC Lands and Resources Incremental Funding
 - We continue negotiations with British Columbia, in partnership with the Alliance of BC Modern Treaty Nations, to secure additional lands and resources funding.
 - We are close to finalizing new models for managing referrals and continue to work through outstanding issues related to land-use pressures.
- DRIPA
 - Modern Treaty Nations continue to attend recurring meetings with British Columbia on this topic. A process will be established with BC and other First Nations to review the Act and determine the best path forward.
- Premier's Forum
 - YG co-hosted the 4th Annual Premier's Forum, where shared Modern Treaty Nation priorities were discussed with the Province to advance Treaty implementation.
 - The event was a big success and all Nations as well as BC were deeply appreciative of us hosting the event in such a befitting manner.
 - I express my thanks to all staff who led the planning and those who worked tirelessly over several months to make this event a great success.
 - My appreciation also to all my executive colleagues for your active participation and representing the Nation so well.

Canada

- Deputy Minister's Oversight Committee
 - Select LCAC (Land Claims Agreements Coalition) member leadership attended meetings in Ottawa to discuss CMTI/Bill C-10, confirm MTN/SGIG economic priorities, and highlight available partnership opportunities. This also provided an opportunity for LCAC to introduce and present key priorities to new ADMs.
- Jordan's Principle
 - In May, we met with the ADM of ISC to discuss the 2025 Operations Bulletin for Jordan's Principle, which has affected service delivery. We continue to advocate for stronger systems to support Modern Treaty Nations.
- Modern Treaty Implementation Policy (MTIP)
 - Work with CIRNAC continues on section 8 of the MTIP.
- Major Projects Office
 - Engagement on major projects under the new *Building Canada Act* remains ongoing, with updates to be provided as this work advances.
- Indigenous-Federal-Provincial-Territorial (IFPT) Meeting with Prime Minister
 - Planning meetings are ongoing to confirm a date for this meeting, likely in September or October 2026.
- Indigenous Leadership Forum/Prime Minister's Forum
 - This forum has not taken place since 2024, and no date has been confirmed.

Municipal

- Continued relationship-building with neighbouring municipalities.
- Ongoing referral and policy review.

LANDS AND RESOURCES

Emergency Program

- Forsite consultants and FNESS FireSmart representatives visited the community to continue work on the Community Wildfire Resiliency Plan (CWRP). Cultural site assessments were completed with the support of a community Elder.
- 15 YG staff and citizens participated in Fire Box training, learning how to safely operate the new fire box equipment and establish water supply through hydrant systems. These efforts strengthen community readiness for the upcoming wildfire season.
- Conducted a two-day EOC training exercise focused on a wildfire scenario requiring the evacuation of the hitacu community through marine transportation.

Marine Stewardship

- Stewardship staff continue to participate in ongoing safety vessel training in preparation for Canoe Journey 2026, including man-overboard response, vessel operations, canoe flip recovery exercises, and on-water safety scenarios. This training builds crew confidence, emergency response capacity, and overall readiness to safely support paddlers throughout the journey.

YG staff worked collaboratively with Toquaht Nation and the DFO to locate and beach a deceased humpback whale that was reported adrift. Although the whale was ultimately not located, the effort demonstrated strong inter-Nation cooperation and provided a valuable opportunity to discuss how similar future events could support the revitalization of cultural practices and knowledge associated with whale stewardship and use.

- Community presentation from BC WildSafe in hitacu on May 20th at Culture night to discuss strategies for human-wildlife coexistence and strategies for securing attractants.

Lands & Community Planning

- Administration hosted the Official Community Plan (OCP) kickoff meeting on May 7 and citizens had an opportunity to share their ideas for the future of hitacu. Community engagement will continue throughout the project, and citizens are encouraged to complete the survey online or by paper copy.
- Administration and consultants have been working cross-departmentally researching how other Modern Treaty Nations address citizen land transfers and legacy housing issues to help inform future planning and policy discussions within Yuułu?it?ath. This will aid in creating a sustainable housing model in the future.
- Cemetery planning remains a priority and Administration have been assessing site requirements and engaging with departments, Elders, and community members to identify options that reflect cultural values, accessibility, environmental considerations, and long-term needs.
- An in-person discussion was held with the Ministry of Forests regarding YG's concerns about unauthorized encampments on Barkley Main Service Road. The Province is currently determining appropriate next steps toward a coordinated, multi-agency response. Next steps include the province identifying the occupants of the sites, developing a coordinated approach for the site located entirely on TSL, and working with partner agencies toward resolution.

- Continued work on DRIPA with the Province
- Potential IFPT (Indigenous-Federal-Provincial-Territorial) meeting in September or October.
- Continued work with the Province on groundwater negotiations.
- Continued work with the Province on lands and resources funding.
- Annual Government-to-Government Leadership Meeting with the Premier and Maa-nulth Nations.
- Join us on June 25 at 5:00 p.m. for a FireSmart burn demonstration showcasing how different building materials perform during a fire. The event will be led by Fire Box-trained YG staff and citizens, the YG Emergency Program, and the District of Ucluelet Fire Department. Dinner and prizes will be provided, and BC Wildfire Service approval has been received for the event.
- Housing and land transfers remain important topics affecting land use, affordability, and community wellbeing. Staff are planning a community learning event to explore the history and context of housing in hita’cu and support informed discussions about future options. The event is tentatively planned for the Yuu’u’iif’at’ Day weekend in September, with further details to be shared in the Umacuk Newsletter.
- Staff are exploring opportunities to share information about the Official Community Plan and gather feedback from citizens living outside of hita’cu, including engagement opportunities coordinated alongside upcoming FSC fish distribution events.

PORTFOLIO HIGHLIGHTS:

- Welcoming of Nanim?saq^wasčišt / Tyson Touchie Sr. as the first Cultural Coordinator in the Culture, Language & Heritage Department. Tyson will be organizing cultural gatherings and activities in the community and supporting the Yuuḥu?it?ath Government as a whole with incorporating Yuuḥu?it?ath Culture into the workplace.
- Community Canoe Use and Canoe Journeys
 - A community canoe use policy and weekly canoe practice safety plan was successfully developed, accepted, and is now in practice governing the safe use of canoes in hitaću.
 - 7 community members were certified by Paddle Canada as Big Canoe Leaders after a weeklong training course was offered April 27 to May 1.
 - Weekly Canoe practices began in May and will continue until late Fall.
 - Canoe Journey planning and practice is underway for a successful journey to Beecher Bay supported by the Lands and Resources support boat staff and the YG Hakuum vessel.
- Tri-fold Placename maps brochures were printed and delivered door to door in hitaću and will be handed out at the next Port Alberni Culture night.
- The Department supported Bi-Monthly Port Alberni Culture nights on March 26 and June 1.
- Successful \$20,000 grant application to Clayoquot Biosphere Trust for Cultural Stewardship funding:
 - Community carving workshops and tool purchase to revitalize the Yuuḥu?it?ath carving practice and safeguard it for future generations
 - Capital purchases of soil screening equipment to support both Yuuḥu?it?ath cultural resource management and community food sustainability by processing archaeological soils into garden soils.
 - Community regalia making for cultural events to preserve Yuuḥu?it?ath identity and textiles art & design.

- Photo exhibition took place on April 29 in collaboration with the UBC indigenous library, showcasing 237 photos taken in hitaču in 1972 by photographer Lianne Andrews.
- Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ hereditary leadership selected 4 citizens from an application process to partake in the Uut-Uustukyuu Traditional Medicine Practitioner Mentorship program for 2026/2027.
- Screened archaeological soils have begun being used in the community garden and will continue to produce high-quality rich soils for future garden use and community food sustainability.
- Received \$230,000 in funding from the Province of BC to support Yuułuʔiłʔatḥ management of sensitive burial caves. Initial fieldwork is to be completed in Fall 2026.

PORTFOLIO HIGHLIGHTS:

Health and Social Services continues to advance community wellness initiatives and strengthen local health service delivery through several important developments.

Health Service Enhancements

- A significant transition this period has been the integration of Medical Transportation services into the Health and Social Services Department. This change supports a more coordinated approach to healthcare access and service delivery for community members. The email remains unchanged but the phone number is now 250-726-7343 (Health Centre).
- We are pleased to welcome a new Registered Nurse (RN) who has joined our team as the Community Care Nurse. This role will strengthen community-based healthcare services and enhance support for individuals and families requiring ongoing care and health navigation, and home support services.
- In addition, we are proud to celebrate the return of one of our own community citizens, who has come home to serve in the Health Care Assistant role. Having community members return to contribute their skills and knowledge strengthens local capacity and reinforces culturally grounded care for our people.
- Weekly doctor visits continue to happen at huupatu Centre every Tuesday, with appointments booked through our medical office assistant.
- Citizens one-time payment has started for the 2025-26 fiscal year and applications can be submitted to citizenship@ufn.ca or drop off at any YG office.

Community Wellness Initiatives

Several wellness-focused programs have been launched or expanded to support healthy lifestyles and community engagement:

- **Walking Groups** have begun and are providing opportunities for community members to increase physical activity, connect socially, and support overall wellness.
- **Monthly Elders Meetings** continue to create meaningful spaces for Elders to gather, share knowledge, provide guidance, and remain connected with community initiatives.
- **Wellness Mondays** have been introduced to promote knowledge around health and wellness; participation in wellness activities across the community.
- **Physiotherapy Support on Fridays** is available, improving access to rehabilitation services and helping community members maintain mobility, manage pain, and support recovery.
- **Mother's Day Celebration** was held in conjunction with culture night where mother's and caregivers were blanketed, and gifted for their dedication to the family.

Looking Ahead

The department remains committed to enhancing health and social services through community-driven programming, strengthened healthcare capacity, and initiatives that support the physical, mental, emotional, and social well-being of all community members. These recent developments represent positive progress toward building a healthier and more connected community.

- A well-attended Fun Day and Childcare Needs Assessment engagement event was held in May.
- Engagement data is being analyzed to inform future childcare planning and priorities.

Youth

PORTFOLIO HIGHLIGHTS:

Housing

- **Five new homes:** Work on the new five single-family homes has reached completion. The homes have reached a lock-up phase and the only thing holding back move-in is the civil construction work (building roads and utility connections and filling in the ground).
- **Alec Road extension:** Gibson Brothers have now completed most works on the Alec Road extension.
- **Repairs following vandalism:** Last bits of work are currently being completed by Valet Restorations.
- **New Housing Society:** The new Mamaḥtiṁinḥ?aaḷa (Housing Society) Act was enacted by Legislature on March 23, 2026, which establishes the mamaḥtiṁinḥ?aaḷa housing society as a Yuutu?it?ath public institution with a mandate to oversee the development, financing, administration, management and maintenance of rental housing for low and moderate income households, with priority given to low and moderate income Yuutu?it?ath households. We are working through projections on how this new entity could operate on our Treaty Settlement Lands.
- **Renovations to District of Ucluelet units:** The Department has been working with contractors to renovate an additional property on Rupert Road, turning it from a single-family unit to a duplex. We are targeting completion this summer.

Infrastructure

- **North Lift Station:** The Department has worked with Gwaii Engineering and Hazelwood Construction to design and start construction of a new lift station for the northern side of the community we are now targeting late summer for the work to complete. A lift station is a set of wells and pumps which allow us to move wastewater up hills.
- **Sewer cleaning:** We completed a sewer cleaning with Pipe Eye on the gravity lines from Gwiyimda (K^wayitma) Road to the south lift station.
- **Solid waste:** Working to deploy the new garbage anchoring system the post and chains have been seeing higher levels of success. Going back to central bins is becoming a less likely option as commercial dumping fees are rising and the dump is increasing penalties for mixed garbage bins.

- **Staff Training:** We have been working with staff to help develop their skills and attain certifications to become water, wastewater, and solid waste management professionals.

Community Buildings

- **Repairs and maintenance:** Caught up with some much-needed repairs and maintenance throughout the community buildings.

UPCOMING ACTIVITIES:

- **Securing funding for sidewalks:** Work is currently happening to try to secure funding to build the community sidewalks which were designed in previous years.
- **Upgrading bus shelters:** We have worked with Ministry of Transportation to secure some funding for new bus shelters which will be the BC transit style.
- **Stormwater management upgrades:** Public Works is planning to do upgrades to storm water management systems.
- **Examining structures for how Economic Development.:** Reviewing MNP’s report on Economic Development and Business Management ideas, this will include a collaborative approach that develops an indigenized perspective specific to Ucluelet First Nation self-determination, additionally a community and citizens engagement session will be held to allow review and feedback.
